Background: Fort Belvoir consists of 8,656 acres of land located along the Potomac River in southern Fairfax County, Virginia and is home to more than 145 distinct mission partners, including a variety of intelligence, logistical, and administrative organizations. The installation also boasts a community hospital on the cutting edge of medical care. As a U.S. Army Garrison, Fort Belvoir provides services to more than 245,000 military, defense civilians, retirees and families. Some of the more significant tenant organizations include NGA, DLA, DTRA, CECOM, INSCOM, Army Cyber Command, DAU, PEO-EIS, as well as National Guard and Reserve components.



Fort Belvoir's rich history can be traced back to 1915, in support of World War I. In 1919 it became camp AA Humphrey, home to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, training military engineers' until the Engineer Center relocated in 1988. It is said that the name change occurred in 1935, from Fort Humphreys to Fort Belvoir, after President Franklin D. Roosevelt's visit to neighboring Gunston Hall, whose owner informed the president of the post's historic past. It is one of the first bases to integrate the natural topography in the design and layout of streets, especially in residential areas which are The Georgian Colonial Revival style (characterized by red brick facades, strict symmetry), and The Spanish Colonial Revival style (characterized by stucco walls and clay tile roofs) which were favored at posts in the south and the west, in areas of traditional Spanish influence.
